SUDBURY, June 5-While a storm over an auxiliary radiator continues to boil in the Shell 4000 car rally, one competitor was wishing a storm would come out of the

Toronto's Paul MacLennan, former winner of the 4000 Rally, was concerned today about the easy and dusty conditions which have prevailed since the start of the rally in Calgary on Saturday night.

"It's very simple, if the onditions don't become conditions more difficult there's no way we are going to win this event," said the American Motors team leader. Mac-Lennan, who now holds down second place after Ireland's Paddy Hopkirk dropped 20 penalty points yesterday, says that tough rallying must start now or he will never catch today's leader Scott Harvey of Detroit. Hopkirk was two minutes early at a check point.

MacLennan and his navigator Jim Peters of Burlington have 16 penalty points, eight more than Harvey.

What MacLennan is trying to say, is that if conditions don't become worse, then Harvey is going to breeze through to the end in Halifax Friday night.

So far MacLennan's Rambler American has had to have only minor adjustments. The car is standing up to every thing that has been thrown at it and only a combination of a break in Harvey's Barracuda and MacLennan's skill is going to put the Torontonian in front.

Meanwhile, Hopkirk is still waiting for a decision about the legality of the auxiliary radiator which incidently mysteriously disappeared yesterday. Hopkirk, who was quoted as saying the radiator was used to "scare off the elephants," has just returned from the South African safari rally and presumably learned there are no elephants in Quebec, the next stage of the

Rally organizer Jim Gunn has explained that official recognition papers have been located by the Canadian Automobile Sports Car Club and should be in Sherbrooke tonight. The CASC is the Canadian governing body of motorsport. The recognition papers could clear up the radiator situation. Basically recognition papers is a blueprint of the cars legal components. However, Gunn has added that some other pages of material may have to be checked before a final result can be reached.

Harvey's Clean Run Leaves Him In Front

SUDBURY — Scott Harvey drove his Barracuda Formula S into the lead in the third day of the Shell 4,000 Rally Tuesday after Monday's leader, Paddy Hopkirk of Ireland, picked up 20 penalties for arriving early at a control point.

Harvey, driving the Chrysler Canada entry, and navigator Ralph Beckman had a clear day and had only the eight penalties picked up during the first two days running.

But the three toughest days are yet to come. And the rally left here early this morning headed for Sherbrooke, Que. This stretch, rally organizer Jim Gunn promised today, should cut the for remaining cars down by at least 10.

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Hopkirk's Mini-Cooper S — already in trouble over the use of an additional radiator to cure overheating problems — thundered into a control point just east of Sault Ste. Marie this afternoon and found he was two minutes ahead of schedule. Despite navigator Mike Kerry's later call for a recheck of the timings, rally officials ruled that the 20 penalties must stand and Hopkirk dropped to fourth place with a total of 24 penalties.

Tied With South African Champ

Tied with him was the Datsun of South African champion Ewold van Bergen and Paul Manson of Toronto which had a fault-free day.

The change in the lead moved Paul MacLennan and Jim Peters of Ontario into second place with the 18 penalties they picked up during the opening two days. Favored to take it all from the start, they drove their American Motors Rambler easily through the 600-mile route from Fort William and, with the two other Ramblers of Hunter Floyd-Lutz Ecker and Tom Jones-Tom Medwell, seemed to be well ahead in the manufacturers' team category.

Equal sixth in the standings were the London, Ont., husband and wife crew of Haydn and Sylvia Gozzard in a Renault Gordini, and fellow Ontario drivers Fritz Hochreuter and Ron Carney in a Porsche 911 T. Both cars zeroed Tuesday's run.

Calgarians Still In Contention

The Calgary crews were still in the rally with the Hammill Motors Datsun 1600, driven by Pat Stiles and Doug Jackman, in 20th place with 116 penalties. They had to stop to replace a shock absorber and picked up 30 penalties moving them out of their overnight 15th position.

The Kramer Chrysler Suppose Arrows overside by Coeff Hame

The Kramer Chrysler Sunbeam Arrow crewed by Geoff Howe and Kneale Johnson ran well after Monday's mechanical troubles had threatened to put them out, but a navigational error cost them

90 penalties for a total of 1443 going into today's trip.

Howe, a Calgary school teacher, said he was naturally dis-

appointed that they were well back in the standings but was determined to stay in to the Halifax finish line on Friday night.

Dr. E. G. F. Skinner of Medicine Hat, who started the rally in number one position, was running last with a total of 1703 penalties. The 60-year-old doctor and his son Mark are driving their Volvo 123 GT with great care in order to finish.

British driver Tony Fall was eighth in the running with 49 penalties. He has a new windshield, bumper and fender to replace those items smashed after his Austin 1800 rolled during Monday's run.

Calgary's Dave Stratton and Walter Petersen took their Mini-Cooper S into 44th place with 695 penalties and the trouble-hounded eastern combination of Klaus Ross and John Bird nursed their Datsun along to keep the Nissan team in the running. They damaged their car in the opening few hours in the foothills near Calgary and had 1331 penalties in 57th place.

Extra Rad Car Rally Mystery

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont. (CP) — The cross-Canada rally has developed some of the characteristics of a mystery with the appearance, then disappearance, of an extra radiator on the front bumper of the leading car.

Paddy Hopkirk of Ireland arrived here Tuesday from Fort William in a Mini-Cooper without the radiator which was added to the car Monday shortly after he left Regina.

Hopkirk said the radiator was knocked off Tuesday morning while he was driving over bumpy roads just outside the Lakehead. When the rad appeared Monday, rally organizers could not decide whether it was a legal addition to the car.

Rally organizer Jim Gunn said Monday he would consult the world governing body of motor sport in Paris to clarify the ruling on additions of radiators.

Most competitors say the additional rad was illegal and Hopkirk should be disqualified. Hopkirk's car overheated on the first leg of the rally and he installed the radiator on the front bumper.

At the halfway point of Tuesday's run to Sudbury, Hopkirk led with four penalty points, four ahead of Scott Harvey of Detroit in a Barracuda.

Paul MacLennan of Toronto in a Rambler-American was third with 16 points.
